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HOMEOWNERS' ASSOCIATION (HOA)

Spring is in full force; the March winds have carried into April and Mother's Day is approaching fast. Most of the snowbirds have left, and the park feels and sounds a little empty. I know there are a lot of full-time residents still here and that is why we will continue the monthly HOA Meetings so long as we have members interested in joining us.

Our last meeting had a great attendance and some people mentioned that they enjoyed the relaxed and calm atmosphere. I want to thank my HOA Board and everyone who was present for helping me keep it that way.

The HOA has requested that the residents please advise their visitors that the speed limit is 15 MPH. This also includes golf carts. There is way too much speeding in the community including residents, visitors, and delivery trucks. This has been addressed to management and they are looking into avenues to resolve the speeding issue. One suggestion, made by Jim Roberts, a resident, is to possibly rent (or sometimes Manatee will provide one cost-free for a short period) a digital speed indicator that would be located near the front entrance. We will keep the membership updated. Bree Borders also stated that there are 4 speed bumps in CLVI. Kevin Karcher stated that Manatee County has no jurisdiction to issue speeding tickets because this community is private property.

When walking at night please do not wear dark clothing and always carry a flashlight. Too many residents have come upon walkers

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at night in dark clothing and no light source and the walker has almost been hit. This is especially true when walking around the curves and turns in the street. Please be proactive and safe.

George Strode asked the board what the purpose of the Advisory Board was within the community. It was explained that Mr. Miller set up an Advisory Board that would oversee both communities until he felt both communities could stand on their own with their HOAs. All resident requests, complaints, and issues go through the Advisory Board and if determined to be valid it would then be taken to management for resolution. The HOA currently has no input in these matters.

There are concerns regarding the safety of the pool with the skimmers not working, and the water being very cloudy. The pool is constantly leaking onto the street in front of the mailboxes and the water has green slime in it. The issues with the pool should be a top priority for management. Our most recent information is that the new equipment for fixing the pool has been ordered and it is unknown how long the pool will be closed once the repairs are underway.

Bree Borders requested that any requests for additional pool chairs, loungers, and tables be submitted to the Advisory Board.

According to Terry West, the pool leak plaguing CLVII for the past few years will be addressed and resolved shortly.

Craig Taunt spoke with Terry West recently regarding the battery for the AED machine and expired fire extinguishers around and in the clubhouse. The fire extinguishers have all been replaced and the AED machine has a new battery. Everyone should keep a clubhouse key with them in the event of an emergency and if necessary, pull the fire alarm located in the clubhouse. The EMS will

respond immediately to the alarm pull. There is also a new emergency phone in the pool area. Kudos to Terry West for his quick response to the safety issues at the clubhouse.

Craig Taunt is also arranging for the North River Fire Department to provide a CPR class in the Fall. We will keep you updated on when this class will be available for the residents of CLVII.

Chet Syjud is not getting anywhere with Newby/MHM regarding the TV at the pool and the large TV in the clubhouse becoming fully operational. Currently, if a resident wants to watch either of those TVs they would have to use their own Rave or Firestick. This is not acceptable and is being addressed. They have asked for two Rave sticks that CLV owns so residents are not using their own RAVE stick. Hopefully, we will know something soon. When Chet heads back north Kevin Karcher will follow through with getting this resolved.

George Schrode and Valerie Kirchhoff have offered to give a presentation in the Fall on different types of "scamming" that have been on the rise recently, especially for senior citizens. The average 60-90-year-old people who are scammed via text, phone, internet, Facebook, etc. are scammed out of an average of \$13,000. We look forward to their presentation in the Fall when they return.

Kim Rickards is very upset that the request for sunshades at the dog park has been refused. This request was refused because management believes the residents are requesting this for their benefit and not that of their pets. Bree has gone to bat with the Advisory Board over this to no avail.

Ron Lorenz has once again taken on the duties of Security and Night Patrol of CLVII. Ron has donated his time over the past 15-16 years to help keep this community safe. He patrols the park at night, checks the clubhouse doors to make sure they are locked, calls

into FPL when streetlights are not operating, advises residents when their light post lights are out, etc. If he becomes aware of an issue, he has the Manatee County Sheriff's Office number and calls them directly to deal with any possible criminal activity that may be happening in our community. Ron has decals for your vehicles or visitor passes your guests can display inside their vehicles while visiting. Please see Ron at 2099 Cheerful to get your decal or guest parking pass. By using the decal and providing your guest with a parking pass you are making the community safer for all of us. Ron has volunteered to set up a presentation by the Manatee County Sheriff's Office on home and individual safety in the Fall.

The HOA still has no information regarding what types of gates are being installed in the front and back entrances or how residents, delivery drivers, EMS equipment will access the new gates, etc. Once we are provided with any information regarding the gates we will pass it to the membership.

Have a great month and see you all at the next HOA meeting. For those of you who are returning to your northern home, you will continue to receive meeting minutes from our meetings. If you have any questions, concerns, or thoughts please contact via email or phone one of your HOA board members so we can discuss this at our next meeting.

NEWS FROM THE MANAGER'S DESK

- Congratulations to April's Home of the Month winners. CLVI winner was 270 Country Ackerman. CLVII winner was 2217 Paradise. Mike. and Carol Dolloff. Thanks to both for their efforts to maintain a beautiful yard.
- Please observe the community rules regarding parking. Overnight parking on the streets is prohibited as well as in your yard or on the grass. Doing so could subject you to being towed. This also applies to golf carts parked in the yard for extended periods. For overnight guests at CLV 2, please use the 5 spaces designated for that purpose, located north of the shuffleboard courts. CLV1 must make other arrangements since Clubhouse parking overnight is prohibited.
- For those headed north for the summer, please plan to have your homes cleaned and yards weeded in your absence. Store anything that could become a hazard in high winds as hurricane season is rapidly approaching.
- Remember to turn in your Resident Checkout forms (available in the office or via email when requested) before leaving for the summer as well. Complete all info on this form including who will be taking care of weeds and who has a key.
- A reminder that political signs/flags/banners may be placed no more than 60 days before a NATIONAL election. No local or non-national election political signs, banners, etc. are allowed.
- Yard debris may not be placed on the street any earlier than 4 PM the night before scheduled trash pickup. No one wants to look at yard debris for days, so please follow this rule to minimize the amount of time it's on the street.
- Please observe the 15 MPH speed limit.

Pedestrians, wildlife, and bicycles have the right of way. Golf carts are also subject to the 15 MPH speed limit.

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



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


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FUN FACTS ABOUT FLORIDA:
